Addressing Poverty in Lamoille: An Interfaith Teach In & Fundraiser

The Interfaith Teach In and Fundraiser will be on Saturday, June 3rd 2023 from 6 – 8 pm at Blessed Sacrament Church, 728 Mountain Road, Stowe, VT.

Passover and Easter are a time to look towards a hopeful future. This year, the Lamoille faith communities come together in direct action against economic injustice in a night of learning and giving. All donations go to support the Interfaith Benevolence Fund, a new partnership with United Way of Lamoille County that will support community members who are experiencing severe economic hardship. Come hear the stories of those directly impacted, alongside experts, clergy, and community members as we work together towards a society that provides for everyone's basic needs and respects the dignity of all. The Keynote Speaker is Representative Saudia Lamont of Morrisville (Lamoille-Washington). Saudia is a graduate of Cornell University's Diversity and Inclusion program, Leadership Lamoille, Bright Leadership Institute, Recovery Coach Academy and holds other certifications. A former infant toddler care provider, founder of the youth program "Developing D.I.I.V.A.S. (Dignity Integrity Independence Virtue and Selfesteem), and a trained-trainer of Prevent Child Abuse VT's "Care for Kids, We Care Elementary, Safe-T, & Nurturing Healthy Sexual Development curricula, she has dedicated much of her life's work to researching and supporting youth growth and development. A former

visionary director and chair of a local antiracism organization, Saudia currently sits on the Board of Directors at Laraway Youth and Family Services and of Lamoille County Mental Health. As a public speaker and workshop presenter, Saudia facilitates understanding of racial justice, health equity, housing access, survivor recovery, and restoring humanity.

Dedicated to family, youth, and community, self-motivated, energetic with integrity, Saudia leads with love, always learning and growing along the way. Her personal mission in life is to help, uplift, support, and inspire anyone she may encounter beginning with herself and her children. She wants her life's work to be loving, inspiring, compassionate, encouraging, open, positive, supportive, memorable, comforting, sustainable, and life-changing.

Update from Executive Committee

This certainly has been a busy month with the arrival of spring and the news that Rev Dev will be leaving us for a full-time position. While we are very sorry to see him leave, we understand that it's a decision he had to make. It's our loss but a great gain for another community. With

that information in mind the 4 chairs of committees are working to form a new search committee. They are working closely with the Conference to begin the process. Our initial thinking is that we want to find a ¾ time person with the goal of growing our Church community. There has been an ongoing discussion about the trees by the side of the Church and how best to deal with them. We have several estimates and several of them are an option to not cut the trees down, but to trim them and do some minor work to keep them in place, but protecting the Church and our neighbor. It would be great if we can safely keep those sugar maples.

We are also going ahead and getting better heating for the dining room. A new "heater" will be put in place and provide a way to heat up the room rapidly. It's actually not a "heater" but more like a radiator with fans, so the heat is circulated rapidly; for a little electricity we can actually have a warm dining room. We also approved a paint job for the dark brown paneling around the room. Tom Weeks has volunteered to take on the job. Thank you, Tom. Several months ago, we received a request from the elementary school asking if the church could become their emergency evacuation place. Jon Henderson has worked with them to make it happen and earlier this month they had their first drill. It went very well. The kids were great and the staff was delighted with the results. Previously all the students and staff had to be loaded onto buses and taken to the High School. Later this spring they will do another drill in which the students are actually picked up from the church to be taken home. It's a much better situation and the school is very thankful for our support. It's great to see the church used this wav.

As a busy social season arrives and various folks get requests about using the Church space, we thought it would be helpful to have everyone know what the policy is for renting the building. We have a form that needs to be filled out and the date needs to be checked to make sure the building is available. Any of the chairs or Emma has access to the form that can be emailed upon request. The use of the sanctuary is \$250. The use of the dining

room/kitchen is \$100. Nonprofits can use the dining room/kitchen area for a contribution. There is no alcohol allowed at any event in the building.

We have begun a comprehensive list of the various projects that need to be done to the building to bring it up to modern day standards. These range from roof repair, the stain glass windows, a new ramp and a handicapped restroom and much more. It certainly seems like a daunting list; we will begin looking for grants and funding that can help us bring our lovely building into the 21century.
